



A PBET Audit Checklist for Service Engineers

If you are a Service (Field) Engineer who must deliver PBET training, it is essential that you be provided with PBET materials; if not, your job will be that much more difficult.

This can help you review all of the materials that your central office should be supplying to you. *Each course should have:*

<u> </u>	Equipment Manual(s) There is a written procedure or job aid for every task. Each written procedure is accurate (it works) and clear (can be followed without confusion or wasted time). Each written procedure is the best way for doing it (based on comparative study, the procedure provided is the BKM). Each job aid (for examples: flow chart, block diagram) is accurate (it works) and clear (can be followed without confusion or wasted time).
<u>=</u>	Objectives There is a list of course performance objectives. The list of course performance objectives is based on a list of tasks that matches the reality of the trainees in my class. All objectives have valid conditions and standards. All objectives are worded clearly and avoid common errors (see table in PBET Participant Guide).
	Basic Support Materials There is a <i>sign-off sheet</i> which lists all of the course objectives in short-form. There is a <i>course map</i> which shows the proper instructional sequence for all of the course objectives. The course map has adequate "horizontals" (built-in flexibility) for meeting individual differences. There is a <i>course prerequisites list</i> ; each prerequisite is stated as a performance.
 	Lesson Plans There is a Lesson Planning Form (LPF) for each lesson on the Course Map. Each LPF has enough detail so that a technically competent service engineer can understand what should be said and done at each part of the lesson. Each LPF has a skill test that matches the objective. Each LPF has at least one practice plan. No LPF wastes time with irrelevant presentation material, but all necessary content is outlined and supported with easy-to-understand teaching aids. At least 10% of all LPFs provide alternate teaching methods for all or part of the lesson. Each LPF has a list of the materials required for teaching the lesson.
	Teaching Materials A Training Manual is supplied in which there is a chapter for each lesson in the course. Each chapter contains the sequence of materials shown on page Develop-1-8 of this book. All of the instructional aids listed on the Lesson Planning Form for each lesson have been created and made available. Adequate training equipment (machines) have been made available for the number of students assigned.
